## Cinderella Swamp Milkweed

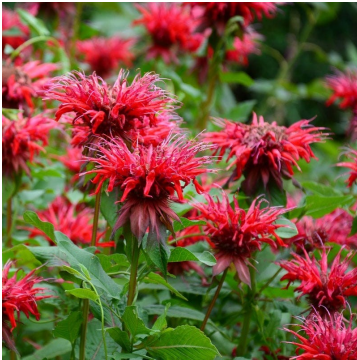


Cinderella' Swamp Milkweed's vanilla-scented flowers are a treat for the senses. Deep pink petals with white centers bloom in 2" wide clusters. Compact in form, 'Cinderella' makes an excellent choice for small, sunny gardens and performs well in low spots and moist areas. Like all swamp milkweeds, 'Cinderella' is a vital host plant for Monarchs, providing essential food and habitat for both the growing caterpillars and adult butterflies.

This is one of the most beautiful milkweeds. Not the common dusty-dull rose-flowered farm weed, but a really beautiful red-flowered form with much more refined foliage and habits. And like the orange-flowered Butterfly Weed, this one is a monarch magnet, great for butterfly gardens.

Bloom time-summer to fall. 36-48" tall, 12-36" wide. Full sun. Average, Moist / Wet soil. Attract Butterflies, Attract Hummingbirds, Attract Birds, Deer Resistant, Rabbit Resistant, Native, Fragrant Flower / Foliage, Extended Bloom Time (more than 4 weeks).

## Fireball Bee Balm



Fireball is a compact growing hybrid with a mid-summer display of bright scarlet-red flowers over glossy green foliage. Compact, clump-forming perennial boasting masses of vibrant scarlet red flowers, Highly attractive to hummingbirds and butterflies. Their vibrant color is set off to perfection by the fresh green leaves, which are very fragrant and is perfect for the front of the border, containers and small gardens. Makes excellent cut flowers.

Performs best in full sun or partial shade. It is not too fussy about soils as long as they are consistently kept moist. Mature height 1-2 ft. Deer and rabbit resistant.

## Walker's Low Catmint



This mounding plant grows to 2 to 3 feet tall and spreads as wide with soft crinkly aromatic grey-green 1-2 inch long leaves with strongly toothed margins that hold sturdy upright spikes of deep lavender-blue flowers of a more vivid color than other catmints. The flowers first appear in May and last through July, often with a rebloom lasting until first frost if the plant is pruned back when initial flowers have faded.

The scented foliage is useful for dried potpourri or for adding fragrance in fresh arrangements. Flowers are attractive to bees, butterflies and birds and the plant is not bothered by deer or rabbits, and curiously also not by cats.

Plant in full sun to light shade in a well-drained soil and irrigate occasional to infrequently. **Landscape habit, uses:** front to middle of borders, groundcover, container, cascading over walls or in rock garden, cut flower; attracts butterflies, bees, hummingbirds; combines well with roses, in front of beebalm, in back of bluish ornamental grasses, Shasta daisies; and for an old-fashioned look with foxgloves, German iris, peonies. Full sun. Tolerates drought once established.
